City Manager's Office News

West Nile Virus Update (w/Attachment): The Orange County Vector Control District (OCVCD) reports that the first indications of West Nile virus in 2016 have been detected in samples of mosquitoes collected from the cities of Seal Beach and La Habra. The District recommends the following actions to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes:



- Eliminate any standing water around your house.
- Make sure all window and door screens on your house are in good repair.
- Wear a repellent containing DEET®, Picaridin, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus, or IR 3535.
- Contact the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District to report dead birds or neglected pools.

Community Development Department News

Samsung Chemical, USA sells (w/Attachment): Samsung Chemical, USA's decision to relocate from Santa Fe Springs to La Palma was a major coup for the City. They had narrowed their choice down to two locations - Irvine and La Palma - eventually deciding on La Palma for their west coast corporate headquarters. On October 29, 2015, the Wall Street Journal reported that the pending sale of Samsung Chemical USA to industry rival Lotte Advanced Materials USA was going to occur. This week the City received official notice that Samsung Chemical, USA located at 6 Centerpointe Drive has changed its name to Lotte Advanced Materials USA, Inc. 5022 Crescent Avenue (w/Attachment): At the end of last year staff reported that George Adamian (hereinafter "Adamian") the owner of the vacant corner at 5022 Walker Street had expressed interest in building townhomes on his property. Adamian had shared concepts for a six unit project on the 20,000sf parcel. About three weeks ago the project's Civil Engineer and Architect came into the City to go over their site plan for the project. During the pre-development application consultation with staff it was identified that Adamian's proposed access off of public street Via Helena would require approval from the Villa Palma Homeowners Association (HOA).

Villa Palma HOA owns a 3 foot strip of land in-between the edge of the Via Helena right-of-way and the subject property at 5022 Crescent Avenue. See attached plans. Adamian's design team requested City assistance to reach out to Villa Palma HOA Board of Directors regarding their request to use the 3 foot strip of land for access to Adamian's proposed project. Staff contacted the Villa Palma HOA's Property Manager Roger Hatlen at Diversified Association Management about scheduling a meeting between the Board of Directors and the adjacent property owner. Staff had learned that the HOA was scheduled to have a regular Board meeting on May 16, 2016.

Mr. Hatlen spoke with the HOA Board of Directors and they indicated a desire for the whole homeowners association to be invited to a special meeting with Adamian rather than at their normal May 16, 2016, meeting. Absent a community club house to hold an Association-wide meeting, staff offered to host the meeting at City facilities to open lines of communications among the HOA and Adamian. Staff is working with both parties to facilitate communications and the meeting.

Community Services Department News

La Palma Days Suspension Notification: Late last and early this week, Director Belknap sent email notification to all 2015 La Palma Days volunteers, participants, and vendors to inform them of the suspension of the event this year. The letter explained the City's financial condition, what has been done to address it, and the likely need for a ballot measure this November. In response, he received a few positive and understanding emails wishing the City well and hoping the event can return in the future. He also received a less positive response from a

participant who was upset that we would cancel an event recognizing veterans and that they “deserve better respect and honor”.

Rehabilitation of Western Orange County Regional Sewers (w/Attachment): The Orange County Sanitation District is preparing to rehabilitate or replace 17 miles of sewer pipelines in the cities of La Palma, Buena Park, Anaheim, Cypress, Los Alamitos, Seal Beach and Rossmoor. The sewer system is more than 50 years old and nearing the end of its service life. The project is required to maintain a reliable and effective wastewater collection system for the western portion of Orange County. When complete, the project extends the service life of the sewer pipes another 40-50 years. The attached memo and fact sheet provides more detail regarding the project’s scope and La Palma’s impacts.

Police Department News

Officers Deal with Barricaded Transient Armed with a Knife: On May 14, 2016, LPPD officers responded to the area of Orangethorpe and Walker regarding several 911 calls of a male subject running in traffic. 911 callers stated the subject’s face and shirt were covered in blood. Upon arrival officers located the subject, later identified as male 36 year-old local transient, in the area of Walker and Fresca. When officers approached him, the subject barricaded himself behind the shrubbery next to an industrial building and threatened to hurt himself.

As officers continued talking and tried to convince the subject to come out, he displayed a knife and stated he was going to end his life. Officers used a great amount of restraint and tact, and continued to negotiate with the subject for nearly two hours with the help of a local resident who was familiar with him. The subject eventually surrendered without further incident. The subject was transported to a local hospital for treatment for his injuries and for a mental health evaluation.

Burglary at Carl’s Jr.: On May 16, 2016, at about 3:20 a.m., LPPD received a notification from the security company of the Carl’s Jr. restaurant located at 5012 La Palma regarding a burglary in progress. The security company reported that they were observing the burglary as it was happening through their CCTV inside the restaurant.

Officers immediately responded and upon their arrival, they saw a male suspect who fled on foot over the block wall into Los Coyotes Elementary School. Additional officers were requested from the Cypress, Buena Park, and Los Alamitos police departments to set up a perimeter around the school and the surrounding areas. An extensive search was conducted with the use of a police helicopter, but the suspect could not be located.

The investigation later revealed that the suspect entered the business by removing the entire window pane without breaking it. A backpack was discovered just outside the point of entry, and officers found power tools and goggles inside, indicating that the suspect may have been trying to get into the safe. Although the suspect was not captured, the officers’ quick response prevented any loss from the restaurant.

Our Detectives are following up on leads and it appears that the suspect was involved in similar crimes in other jurisdictions. Detectives are making good progress in identifying the suspect.

Officers going above and beyond: On the evening of May 13, an 8 year-old girl and her parents came to the front lobby of LPPD regarding the theft of her bicycle. The little girl was crying and emotionally upset as she told the officer that someone had stolen her bicycle from the patio area of her apartment complex within the last couple of hours. No suspects were seen or heard, and the officer took a theft report before sending the family home.

Later in the evening, the officers from the same shift went to Wal-Mart and purchased a new bicycle and a bike helmet for the girl. The girl's family was then called and asked to return to LPPD. When the family came back to the police station, they were surprised with a new bicycle, courtesy of LPPD officers. The girl and her parents were very surprised and grateful.

First Indications of West Nile Virus in 2016

Garden Grove, CA. The first indications of West Nile virus in 2016 have been detected in samples of mosquitoes collected from the cities of Seal Beach and La Habra. The mosquitoes tested positive for the virus on May 13, 2016. The Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District (District) routinely monitors populations of adult mosquitoes and tests groups of adult female mosquitoes for the presence of West Nile virus.

District staff will post signs and distribute flyers alerting residents to the detection of the virus, and preventative measure they can take to prevent becoming infected. Additional staff has been allocated to canvass the area to look for mosquito breeding sources, expand public education, and work with city officials to correct infrastructure issues.

The District urges the public to conduct routine property inspections for mosquito-breeding sources. Look for any standing water around the house or neighborhood and either remove the water source, or contact the District to inspect and treat the source. Remember, mosquitoes can complete their life cycle in just one week in a water source as small as a bottle cap. If you find a dead bird, call the District as soon as possible. A District representative will collect all viable dead birds and submit them for testing.

Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District makes following recommendations to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes:

- Eliminate any standing water around your house.
- Make sure all window and door screens on your house are in good repair.
- Wear a repellent containing DEET®, Picaridin, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus, or IR 3535.
- Contact the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District to report dead birds or neglected pools.

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
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

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

RE: Orange County Sanitation District – Rehabilitation of Western Regional Sewers
Project Overview and City Impacts

The Orange County Sanitation District is preparing to rehabilitate or replace 17 miles of sewer pipelines in the cities of La Palma, Buena Park, Anaheim, Cypress, Los Alamitos, Seal Beach and Rossmoor. The sewer system is more than 50 years old and nearing the end of its service life. The project is required to maintain a reliable and effective wastewater collection system for the western portion of Orange County. When complete, the project extends the service life of the sewer pipes another 40-50 years.

The project consists of 2 phases, Phase 1 is the planning and design phase and began in April 2016. The second phase, construction, is anticipated to begin in 2019.

The project impacts La Palma in the following areas:

1. Denni Avenue, from La Palma Avenue to the southerly City limits
2. Moody Street, from Crescent Avenue to the southerly City limits

In La Palma, the work includes the following:

- Manhole inspections and verifications
- Video taping of the sewer lines in Denni and Moody
- Manhole rehabilitations at Denni/La Palma and Moody/Crescent
- Pipeline rehabilitation through the installation of a liner inside the existing pipe.

Staff is working with the San District consultants to issue permits for the manhole inspections and video tapping of the sewer lines. Staff will coordinate providing as-built documents for the construction documents. Staff will coordinate notification of work with impacted neighborhoods as the schedule becomes available.

FACT SHEET

Rehabilitation of Western Regional Sewers

Background

The Orange County Sanitation District (OCSD) is a public agency that provides wastewater collection, treatment and disposal services for approximately 2.5 million people in central and northwest Orange County. OCSD operates two facilities – Reclamation Plant No. 1 in Fountain Valley and Treatment Plant No. 2 in Huntington Beach – and treats an average of 200 million gallons of wastewater each day.

What is this project?

This project will rehabilitate or replace 17 miles of four (4) existing sewer pipelines through six (6) cities and the unincorporated area of Rossmoor. In addition, the project will upgrade the Westside Pump Station in Rossmoor by replacing the wet well and installing odor control measures.

Where is this the work taking place?

Construction will take place in the cities of La Palma, Buena Park, Anaheim, Cypress, Los Alamitos, Seal Beach and unincorporated Rossmoor. *Please see map for street locations.

Why is the project needed?

The aging infrastructure is more than 50 years old and nearing the end of its service life. This project is required to maintain a reliable and effective wastewater collection system for the western Orange County community. Extending the service life will protect public health, increase system reliability, reduce the risk of sewer spills, and make normal operations and maintenance efforts safer. This project will extend the useful life of the sewer pipes another 40-50 years.

When is the project scheduled?


There will be two phases to this project. The first phase is planning and design which began in April 2016. The second phase is construction, which is expected to begin in 2019.

What impacts can be expected?

During the design phase there will be periodic exploratory work which could involve activity in the streets and temporary lane closures; **there will also be** activity at the pump station. Notifications will be distributed and posted on our website with specific locations and schedules prior to work taking place.

The Orange County Task Force on Drowning Prevention/OCTA Media Campaign Launch Event will take place on Wednesday, May 25 at 10:30 a.m. at William Woollett Jr. Aquatics Center in Irvine. Traffic Collision Cut and Rescue – May 12 - At 10:32 a.m. ORCO Helicopter 2 responded to a reported TC Cut and Rescue at the south bound 241 near the 133 interchange. As ORCO Helicopter 2 arrived on scene a CHP Helicopter had already landed next to the patient's vehicle along with a CHP Ford Explorer that had also made access. The patient's vehicle had traveled 200 feet down an embankment parallel to the 241. The victim had been trapped and unnoticed for 14 hours, until spotted overhead by the CHP Helicopter. To access the patient, the CHP Patrol officer had to drive over a dirt culvert off the 241 and drive down a series of old cement access roads to make contact with the victim. The culvert was too steep for the ground ambulance, Truck 43, Engine 27 and ORG Engine 7 access to the patient was made by foot. The determination was made by the Incident Commander to insert the Medic and Truck 34 rescuer and hoist the patient out by stokes basket via ORCO Helicopter 2. It was also determined the patient had too many spinal issues to be driven out by a four wheel drive vehicle up the old cement road and steep culvert. The patient was hoisted to the aircraft and flown to OC Global as a trauma.
