#### City Manager's Office News

**Agenda Summary:** The Successor Agency agenda has Minutes and a Register of Demands for approval. As a reminder, May 17 was the final Planning Commission meeting.

The City Council Consent Calendar has routine items as well, along with the Resolutions required for the November 8 General Municipal Election. Please note that should the City Council decide at a later date to bring forward a revenue measure that the Resolutions required for that will be brought forward at that time.

Also on the Consent Calendar is the Water Conservation Monthly Report for April – Residents should be proud of the 22.6% reduction in usage year over year. The City did receive news that effective April that our mandated reductions was reduced from 20% to 13% due to the City's participation in the Orange County Water District (OCWD) and Orange County Sanitation District (OCSD) Groundwater Replenishment System (GWRS).

Additional items include the 2016 Annual Water Quality Report and an Award of Contract for janitorial services.

Regular items include:

- Acceptance of an Irrevocable Offer of Dedication for Certain Property Located at 5062 Orangethorpe Avenue for Future Public Right-of-Way Purposes. On February 3, 2015,

the Planning Commission approved Precise Plan 277, a request by McDonalds to rebuild their store at 5062 Orangethorpe Avenue. Condition of Approval No. 30, of approving Resolution No. 2015-02, requires McDonalds to prepare an irrevocable offer to dedicate a 10 foot by 100 foot area adjacent to Orangethorpe Avenue for a future bus turn out.

- Award of Contract for the La Palma Avenue Rehabilitation Project from Moody Street to Valley View Street. The Fiscal Year 2015-16 Budget and Capital Improvement Plan includes the pavement rehabilitation of La Palma Avenue Rehabilitation Project from Moody Street to Valley View Street; with funding carried-over and approved in the Fiscal Year 2016-17 Budget. Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) funds in the amount of \$500,000 were granted to the City of La Palma for this project to offset costs for construction.
- Resolution Amending the Salary Schedule for the La Palma Professional Employees Association. The current Water Supervisor is resigning his position effective June 30, 2016. A primary responsibility and legal mandate of this position is to serve as the Chief Operator of the City's water system. The City has benefitted in recent years because the current Maintenance Supervisor also has his required water certifications which allows him to serve as the backup Chief Operator when the Water Supervisor is on any leave, such as vacation. The current Maintenance Supervisor Job Classification does not require these water certifications, but in a small agency the redundancy is especially useful. In 2013 the Maintenance Supervisor salary was benchmarked to the Water Supervisor salary, with both positions having the same salary schedule. In anticipation of the recruitment, staff is taking the opportunity to create two Water/Maintenance Supervisor positions in lieu of a single Water Supervisor and a single Maintenance Supervisor position in order to attract qualified candidates and to provide continued backup for this critical position.
- Legislative Briefing. Staff monitors pending legislation and from time to time brings specific legislation to the City Council to inform them as to how some of the bills could affect the City and its residents, and to seek direction on opposition or support of specific bills. Four bills are recommended for opposition and five are recommended for support.
- Public Engagement Survey Results. The City approved a consulting agreement in March to assist the City in its communications and outreach efforts regarding City resident priorities. That agreement included conducting a survey to ascertain public perceptions of the City, priorities for City services, and constituent views towards a potential locally enacted and controlled revenue measure. Dr. Timothy McLarney from True North Research will present the results of the survey at the meeting, in the form of an Executive Summary and a Power Point presentation.

**Police Department News**

**WalMart Noise Complaint Update:** Police Management met with a La Palma resident and WalMart management this past week to discuss noise concerns resulting from produce deliveries being made before 7 a.m. When discussing the resident’s concerns about the early deliveries we found that she had two issues of concern; First, deliveries occurring prior to 7 a.m.; however it was reported that this has been occurring less frequently since the Police Department has been conducting increased enforcement. Second, is that trucks are parking too close to the block wall that separates the store property from the resident’s backyard, infringing on the family’s privacy.



WalMart Management will make a continued effort to inform delivery drivers to park in front of the business when deliveries are made before 7 a.m. and make every effort to direct truck drivers to stay clear of the block wall whenever possible.

The resident was encouraged to contact the Police Department when delivery trucks arrive before 7 a.m., as well as report any noise concerns.

## **NEWS AND EVENTS**

- The OCFA Board of Directors has proclaimed May 1 – 7 Wildfire Awareness Week. OCFA has been using social media to highlight wildland prevention and preparedness to raise the public's awareness of wildfires and being prepared. You can read more about the social media outreach campaign in the news release. If you haven't done so already, please be sure to like/follow/visit the OCFA Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram pages to keep up to date on our safety campaigns, recent incidents, and news.
- In addition to the Wildfire Awareness Week social media campaign, this month OCFA will be focusing on drowning prevention outreach. This includes the Orange County Task Force on Drowning Prevention's media campaign, as well as more than 35 OCFA drowning prevention events scheduled through July.
- We are deeply saddened by the sudden passing of dear friend, colleague, OCFA Board Director, and Laguna Niguel Councilmember Jerry McCloskey on Tuesday, May 24. Jerry's absence will be felt on the OCFA Board, in the City of Laguna Niguel, and throughout Orange County. Please join us in keeping Jerry's family in your thoughts and prayers.
- This past Sunday, the Orange County Fire Authority Benevolent Association hosted the OCFA Tribute Ceremony at the Phoenix Club in Anaheim. The dinner is held annually to honor OCFA operations personnel, as well as professional staff who have retired during the last year. OCFA ECC Supervisor Ryan Turner served as the emcee and the Orange County Fire Authority Pipes & Drums provided the post dinner entertainment.
- On Wednesday night, May 11, Academy 42 graduation ceremonies were held at the OCFA Regional Fire Operations and Training Center for 36 new firefighters. The event was open to the public and well attended. The graduation keynote speaker was Orange County Board of Supervisors Chair Lisa Bartlett, who also serves as an OCFA board director. The graduates demonstrated their skills by way of live structure fire demos, building repelling, and auto extrications.

**Step 1: Create a Wildfire Action Plan** with detailed information your family will need if a wildfire approaches. Key components include:

- Family Evacuation Plan
- Family Communication Plan
- Pet Disaster Plan
- Your Children's School Disaster and Evacuation Plans
- Your Workplace Disaster and Evacuation Plans

**Step 2: Create a Disaster Supply Kit** with food, water, and other supplies for at least 72 hours, and smaller kits for your car and workplace in case a wildfire or other disaster stops you from going home.

**Step 3: Create a separate Go! Bag** for prescription medications, copies of important documents, and items of personal importance.

**Step 4: Don't forget to make a Pet Disaster Kit!**

If you're forced to evacuate, having these items ready-to-go will make it easier for everyone during and after the wildfire. Other important wildfire readiness steps include:

- Have fire extinguishers on-hand that your family is trained to use
- Have a portable radio or scanner available so you have access to updated emergency information
- Make sure family members know where and how to shut off gas, electricity and water
- Register with Alert OC, a mass notification system designed to keep you informed if a wildfire or other emergency occurs, or is expected in your area

**Remote Rescue – May 28** - At 9:56 a.m., a remote rescue response was dispatched to a hiker down at Black Star Falls. Helicopter 2 was able to locate the victim from the air and lowered down the rescue medic for patient evaluation. Helicopter 2 found a 29-year-old female who had suffered a head injury from a branch that had fallen 30-40 feet from a large oak tree. The patient was determined to be a trauma and was treated and packaged on scene. She was hoisted into Helicopter 2 with the assistance of a Truck 9 rescuer and flown directly to OC Global with continued ALS evaluation enroute.

### Irvine

**Structure Fire – May 29** - At 2:29 p.m. an automatic water flow alarm was balanced to a structure fire response on Duryea Ave, Irvine. Engine 6 arrived on-scene and reported smoke showing from a large one story commercial building doing business as Electrolurgy INC. Engine 6 established command and balanced the incident to a working structure response. Battalion 9 arrived on-scene and assumed Duryea Incident Command. Battalion 5 arrived on-scene and assisted Battalion 9. Engine 79 was assigned Division Bravo with Engine 28 and Engine 6 reporting to him. Truck 76 was assigned the task of ventilation. At 2:50 p.m. Division Bravo called for emergency gross decontamination of exiting crews due to possible hazardous materials involvement. Engine 74 was assigned emergency gross decontamination of exiting crews. Engine 6, Engine 28, and Engine 79 were gross deconned and their turnouts were collected. Safety 27 arrived on-scene and was assigned incident safety. The forward progress of the fire was stopped at 2:54 p.m. No civilian or firefighter injuries were reported.

Haz-mat 4 and Haz-mat 204 were called to the scene to stabilize the potential hazardous materials release. Haz-mat 4 and 204 were assigned Haz-mat group, Truck 76 was reassigned Medical Group with CARE 6506 reporting to him, and Engine 74 was assigned to technical decontamination. Haz-mat Group Supervisor reported to the Incident Commander that Liquid Chromate was contained to the containment berms within the building. A representative from OC Health Haz-mat (Mark Sutphin) arrived on-scene and coordinated the release of the building back to the responsible party. OC Health Haz-mat will remain on-scene and monitor the hazardous materials clean up. Engine 6, Engine 28, and Engine 79 equipment was technically decontaminated and their personnel were issued loaner turnouts. Duty Chief and Division 2 were notified on scene by Battalion 9 and Battalion 5.

Irvine PD and representatives from the business responded. A property release was prepared by the Engine 6 Captain and the scene was left in care of the building owner.

**Aerial Assistance – May 29** - At 8:48 a.m., a remote rescue response was dispatched to a reported hiker down on Lynx Trail in Aliso Woods Canyon Park. DUKE was able to locate the patient visually and ground units were able to make access and assess the patient. Due to the patient's status, Helicopter 2 performed a hoist operation and transported the patient directly to Mission.

### **Laguna Beach**

**Remote Rescue – May 30** - At 3:12 p.m. Helicopter 2 was requested by Laguna Beach Fire to assist with a rescue on Table Rock Beach. A female had jumped down on to the beach and suffered an ankle injury. Due to incoming tide cutting off any access to the beach the only way to get the patient off the beach was via the helicopter. Helicopter 2 arrived on scene and inserted the rescue medic. Once the patient was packaged, she and the rescuer were hoisted back into the helicopter and they flew direct to Mission Hospital Mission Viejo.
