City Manager's Office News



West Nile Virus Update: The Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District (OCVCD) reports that the number of adult mosquitoes that have tested positive for West Nile virus in 2016 has more than doubled in the past seven days, bringing the total to 113 samples collected in 22 Orange County cities (Map Attached). The findings are compounded by the announcement of the first human West Nile virus infection by the Orange County Health Care Agency on August 3, 2016, underscoring the importance of mosquito breeding and bite prevention. To date, there have been 4 positive samples collected in La Palma.

To avoid being bitten by mosquitos, the OCVCD recommends that residents take the following steps:

- Eliminate any standing water around your house.

- Make sure all window and door screens on your house are in good repair.
- Wear a repellent containing DEET®, Picaridin, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus, or IR 3535.
- Contact the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District to report dead birds or neglected pools. 714-971-2421 or 949-654-2421 or www.ocvcd.org

Community Development News

ADP Gas generators: ADP just completed the installation of two large natural gas generators in the rear of their property adjacent to the 91 Freeway. The generators use natural gas to convert to electric power for their campus. While touring the facility last week ADP Senior Facilities Manager estimated the company would save close to 60% on their monthly electric bill. That is good news for them, but it will also have a downward effect on the amount of Utility Users Tax (UUT) the City receives from ADP's account.



Community Services News

La Palma Avenue Pavement Project (w/Attachment): Due to various factors beyond the City's control, the paving schedule for La Palma Avenue has been pushed past the original deadline. Our plan was to have the project completed prior to the start of school on August 10. To minimize the impacts on school traffic, we have authorized grinding and paving operations to take place on a few Saturdays. The updated schedule is as follows:

Wednesday, August 3 – Backfilling of asphalt curb slots

Thursday and Friday, August 4 & 5 – Lowering of utility covers too prepare for grinding

Saturday, August 6 – Grind 4" Section & Pave Back 2" Leveling Course on section from Walker Street to Moody Street

Thursday, August 11 (9am-2pm) – Grind 2" Section from Walker to Valley View Street

Friday, August 12 (9am-2pm) – Continue Grind 2" Section from Walker to Valley View Street

Saturday, August 13 – Cap 2" Section from Walker to Valley View Street

Saturday, August 20 – Cap the remaining 2" on the 4" section from Walker Street to Moody Street

Monday, August 22 through Wednesday, August 24 – Raise all utility covers

Thursday, August 25 – Install Traffic Loops

Friday, August 26 through Friday, September 16 – Cat track, striping and demobilization



Unfortunately we need to take out four eucalyptus trees in the medians between Bravo Lane and Westra Lane. These tree trunks have grown too large for the section of median bulb they are in and have damaged both the pavement and concrete curbing, which is being replaced. In consultation with an arborist, the tree roots can't be cut back or the trunk notched without compromising the tree's stability. These are scheduled for removal next week.

Civic Expo Dunk Tank: Last Saturday, at the Civic Expo and National Night Out, Recreation Supervisor Robinson was able to secure a donated Dunk Tank to raise funds for Concerts in the Park. Thank you to Mayor Goedhart, Council Member Shanahan, and Captain Kim for volunteering to take turns in the tank. In total \$305 was raised for which CAB was incredibly excited and thankful for the additional donation. The entire event was a success with many taking the opportunity to meet the various organizations and City Departments.

Police Department News

Mental Patient Arrested: On August 2, 2016 officers were contacted by the La Palma Intercommunity Hospital (LPIH) staff regarding a female mental patient who had walked away from their emergency room. Officers located the female near Central Park and made numerous attempts to contact her, but she kept running away. She then climbed onto the covered patio of a residence in the 4900 block of El Rancho Verde and forcibly broke into a second story bedroom and then climbed onto a shed and refused to come down.

After a lengthy negotiation with the suspect and assistance from the Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA), officers were able to take her into custody. She was booked at La Palma jail for a felony residential burglary and later transported to the Orange County Jail.

Officer Interrupts Commercial Burglary: On August 4, while conducting a patrol check of the commercial complex at 7002 Moody, an officer caught a glimpse of someone possibly running westbound through the parking lot. Upon further investigation, it was discovered that the store front window of the New Hair Connection (Suite #111) was smashed. Additional officers responded and found several tools inside the business that appeared to be left by the suspect but the suspect was not located. Detectives are conducting a follow-up investigation.



La Palma Street Projects Keep Residents On The Move

LA PALMA, Calif. – Over the last two months, several capital street projects have begun. The Valley View and Fresca Streets rehabilitation project along with the Americans with Disabilities pedestrian ramp replacement project, to meet required updated federal standards which have changed since the ramps were installed, are nearing completion. Both of these projects are largely funded by federal grants, which allows the City to stretch its Capital Improvement Program dollars. A current project recently underway is the La Palma Avenue, from Moody Street to Valley View Street, rehabilitation project. Also supplemented with federal funding, this project includes sidewalk, curb and gutter repairs, and full pavement overlay. As this is a major arterial street through La Palma, the work schedule includes Saturdays to minimize impacts to residents. This is especially important as local schools begin classes on August 10, 2016. Drivers are reminded to slow down in the construction zone and carefully look for students in the area on their way to and from school. The major components of the project are expected to be completed the week of August 22, 2016; with only striping, clean-up, and demobilization to be finished by mid-September. When completed these projects will improve vehicular and pedestrian mobility on these streets and sidewalks; and maintains La Palma's high infrastructure standard.

About the City of La Palma

Ranked by Money Magazine in 2007, 2011, and 2013 as one of America's Best Places to Live, the City of La Palma is a 1.9 square mile general law city in northwest Orange County, consisting of 15,568 residents and approximately 300 commercial and industrial businesses. The City was incorporated in 1955 under the name of Dairyland and has 55 full-time and 35 part-time employees.

SIGNIFICANT INCREASE IN MOSQUITOES INFECTED WITH WEST NILE VIRUS FOUND IN ORANGE COUNTY

Garden Grove, CA. The number of adult mosquitoes that have tested positive for West Nile virus in 2016 has more than doubled in the past seven days, bringing the total to 113 samples collected in 22 Orange County cities (Map Attached). The findings are compounded by the announcement of the first human West Nile virus infection by the Orange County Health Care Agency on August 3, 2016, underscoring the importance of mosquito breeding and bite prevention.

“The Orange County and Mosquito and Vector Control District has significantly increased the number of mosquito control personnel, community outreach and education, and expanded our surveillance efforts throughout the County in 2016, but those enhancements are not enough to suppress virus transmission during peak mosquito breeding months. We need the assistance of every Orange County resident to help keep our communities free from vectors and vector-borne disease. A single stagnate water source can produce enough mosquitoes to potentially threaten the lives of an entire neighborhood, as mosquitoes can fly several miles in search of a blood meal.” stated Rick Howard, District Manager.


In areas where West Nile virus has been detected, District staff are posting signs and distributing flyers alerting residents to the detection of the virus, and preventative measures they can take to prevent becoming infected. Additional staff has been allocated to canvass these areas to look for mosquito breeding sources, expand public education, and work with city officials to correct infrastructure issues.

Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District makes following recommendations to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes:

- Eliminate any standing water around your house.
- Make sure all window and door screens on your house are in good repair.





- Crew from Engine 46 (C Shift) participated in a National Night Out event in **Stanton**. The event was on August 3 from 5 p.m. – 8 p.m.

Vegetation Fire – July 28 - At 11:36 a.m. CHP reported a vehicle with an engine compartment fire at the NB 73 and Newport Coast Drive in Irvine. This incident location is a threat to SRA; all state notifications were made. Engine 4 arrived onscene reporting the vehicle fire had spotted into vegetation and requested two additional engines. Engine 4 extinguished the spot fire in the vegetation at 11:52 a.m. Engine 4 mopped up the 50' x 50' spot and all other units were cancelled.
