City Manager's Office News

Agenda Summary: The Successor Agency agenda only has the Minutes for approval.

The City Council Consent Calendar has routine items as well, including the Water Conservation Monthly Report for August 2016 and the Conflict of Interest Code Amendment.

There are three Public Hearing Items scheduled. One for the introduction and first reading of the 2016 Building Code Amendments and the second for the introduction and first reading of the 2016 Fire Code Amendments. The third is a Resolution designating Bransford Drive (Walker Street to Tiara Lane), Walker Street Frontage Road, Bon Villa Circle, and Caprice Circle as Residential Permit Parking Area "B". The concern of residents on these streets is the

overflow parking from the apartment complex at 5600 Orangethorpe Avenue. Homeowners are concerned that cars from this complex are leaving vehicles parked for extended periods of time, creating limited parking for homeowners and their guests. Besides the safety concerns for occupants of the vehicles crossing without using the proper pedestrian crossing, this has contributed to increased trash, occurrences of illicit activity, and vandalism in the neighborhood. Residents of this area have signed a petition meeting the threshold required by the Municipal Code to bring the request forward to the City Council.

The only Regular Business Item is a Banking Service Agreement with City National Bank. The City of La Palma has had a long standing banking relationship with Bank of America for general banking and merchant services; however, several local agencies throughout California have received notification from Bank of America that their City accounts would be closed and had 90-days to move their accounts to another financial institution. Staff reached out to its Bank of America representative who informed us that the City's account was unlikely to be at risk for 2016, but could be in early 2017 upon the second wave of closure notices. Staff conducted an informal RFP and completed a full review of enhanced financial services including trust and investment services, of which City National Bank provided the best complement of banking amenities. Staff is prepared to make the transition from Bank of America to City National upon approval by the City Council. The process is expected to 3-6 months.

United States Flag at Half-Staff: President Obama ordered the US Flag to fly at half-staff until sunset on September 30, 2016, as a mark of respect for the memory of Shimon Peres, former President and Prime Minister of Israel.



Community Development News

Development Committee: At the September 19, 2016, special meeting of the Development Committee, the committee unanimously approved an Amendment to Precise Plan 007 for a residential remodel and addition at 5012 Cartagena Circle. The Development Committee also reviewed the proposed electronic billboard north of the 91 Freeway that is proposed at 6907 Marlin Circle. The Committee approved a Resolution recommending approval of the project, Precise Plan 276, to the City Council. The City Council is scheduled to see the Precise Plan 276 and the associated Conditional Use Permit 362 on the agenda of the October 18, 2016, City Council Meeting. The next regularly scheduled meeting of the La Palma Development Committee will be on Monday, November 14, 2016.

Governor Brown signs into law two bills for accessory dwelling units (ADU's) to usurp local zoning control: On September 27, 2016, Assembly Bill AB-2299 [Bloom] and Senate Bill SB-1069 [Wieckowski] were signed by the Governor after having passed both houses of the State Legislature with bipartisan support. Both pieces of legislation seek to remove local zoning constraints by streamlining the approval and construction processes for ADU's, also commonly referred to as "Granny Flats," to increase the affordable housing supply.

Senate Bill 1069 is the most extensive bill on accessory dwelling units to be signed into law since the original ADU legislation was enacted by the State back in 2003. SB-1069 aims to ease local regulatory burdens by eliminating sprinkler requirements, providing numerous exceptions to parking restrictions, requiring ministerial approval for the remodeling of existing

homes and garages when they are compliant with building and safety codes, and making utility connection fees for brand new construction proportionate to the burden the accessory dwelling will place on the water or sewer systems.

Complimenting SB-1069 is AB-2299 which requires local governments to adopt accessory dwelling unit ordinances with explicit specifications for what is required of those ordinances. The new specifications include prohibiting the need for a passageway, increasing the permissible size of the units, and eliminating some parking requirements.

It was written into the new bills that in the event a local agency has an existing accessory dwelling unit ordinance that fails to meet the requirements of the state law, that ordinance shall be null and void upon the effective date of these bills (January 1, 2017). The local agency shall thereafter apply the standards established by the state law for the approval of accessory dwelling units, unless and until the agency adopts an ordinance that complies with state law. Legislative Digests for both bills are provided in this Friday Report. Staff will discuss this with the City Attorney's office to determine if any code amendments are warranted.

7872 Walker Street Update: In the June 30, 2016 weekly report we identified that medical professional building south of City Hall was purchased by Dr. Winton Wong of Joshua Medical. We indicated that they would be focused on renovating the first floor and address deferred maintenance of the building so he can open offices in La Palma. On August 10, 2016, the Community Development Department issued tenant improvement permits for a \$1.7M renovation. This week their team indicated they will be replacing the Fichus and Coral Trees with large King Palms similar to those installed at City Hall. They anticipate removing their trees within the next week to clear the way for exterior painting. Their new paint will be two tone with first floor of the building and the red brick walkways painted a charcoal color and the second floor an eggshell white color.

Community Services News

City Yard (Meadowlark) Well Feasibility Study Update: The City Yard Well Feasibility Study is moving forward and the well pump and appurtenances were reinstalled a few weeks ago. The goal of the Study is to improve the quality of the water pumped from our aquifer and reduce the amount of naturally occurring arsenic found in the groundwater; potentially averting the need of an expensive arsenic treatment plant in the future. The well has been in operation at a reduced rate of flow for several weeks so that test water sampling can be achieved, at which point our consultants can plot a projected study schedule for presentation to the State Department of Drinking Water for approval. Once approved, the well will be brought back on line and in full operation, again providing high quality drinking water to the community's water system.

Test Block Wall Painting at City Hall: Maintenance division will be conducting a block wall test painting project at City Hall on Saturday, October 15, 2016. Painting of four 16 Foot block wall sections with four different paint types (all the same color) will be competed. La Palma Christian Center volunteers will be doing the painting, under the supervision of Maintenance Division staff. After the painting is complete, staff will routinely monitor and recommend which paint is best suitable for future City wide block wall painting projects.



Fire Hydrant Severed: On Tuesday September 27th, a fire hydrant was severed in a traffic collision in the Centerpointe Drive development and resulted in a fountain-like geyser of water flowing onto Centerpointe Drive. Orange County Fire Authority responded initially and attempted to turn off the flow of water, but ultimately were unable to do so. Water Division staff stepped in and stopped the rush of water so that the vehicle could be removed and the area traffic restored to normal. The excessive water loss resulted in two reports of discolored water, one business and one residence. Both calls were investigated and only light local flushing was required.

Police Department News

UASI Grant Approved to Replace Old Police Radio Equipment: Based on the resolution adopted by the City Council on the June 21, 2016 Council meeting, the City has been awarded funds from the Department of Homeland Security via the Santa Ana Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) Grant unit, to replace an old police radio equipment that is in need of replacement. The new equipment is estimated to cost about \$7,000 including installation.

ORANGE COUNTY WATER DISTRICT BOARD INVESTS IN INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECT TO BRING WATER RELIABILITY TO THE REGION DURING HISTORIC DROUGHT

FOUNTAIN VALLEY, Calif. (September 23, 2016) — At Wednesday’s board meeting, the Orange County Water District (OCWD; the District) board of directors enthusiastically approved the first step toward making the world’s largest water reuse project even bigger. The Groundwater Replenishment System (GWRS), which earlier this week celebrated its 200-billion-gallon production milestone, is on its way to moving forward with a 30-million-gallon-a-day (MGD) Final Expansion. This would bring the project’s total water production to 130 MGD, enough water for 1 million people annually. It would also bring increased water reliability to Orange County and is the type of water infrastructure investment that must be implemented throughout California to make the state’s water supply more sustainable.

“The GWRS has been a major part of the District’s water supply portfolio since 2008 and our ongoing investment in it has continued to pay off,” said OCWD President Cathy Green. “This project has helped the region better weather drought and water supply challenges and provides high-quality water to refill the groundwater basin we manage. Other less reliable sources used to fill the basin include natural rainfall, stormwater, imported water, and Santa Ana River water. The 19 retail water producers we serve currently get 75 percent of their water supply from the basin. So, we are all very fortunate that GWRS water is the most reliable source we have and that we’re able to increase production. GWRS water currently satisfies 23 percent of the water demand for these agencies. I’m so proud of this project which serves as a global model for water sustainability and we will continue to explore all options that bring new water to the region,” she added.

The Final Expansion, estimated for completion in 2022, would produce enough water to fulfill another seven percent of the water demand. This means that the GWRS alone would account for sustaining 30 percent of the water demand for the agencies OCWD serves. This is a tremendous cost savings for them and increases their overall water reliability. To meet their full water demand, the 19 agencies must also purchase costly imported water, so the more water they get locally from the groundwater basin, the better. Imported water is more than twice the cost of local groundwater.

A joint project of OCWD and the Orange County Sanitation District (OCSD), the original 70 MGD GWRS facility went online in January 2008. A 30 MGD Initial Expansion was put into operation in May 2015 bringing the GWRS to its current 100 MGD capacity. In April 2015, the two districts began formally exploring the feasibility of the GWRS Final Expansion, which would bring the facility to its 130 MGD ultimate capacity, when their boards approved \$2 million to study the possibility of using flows from OCSD's Plant 2. Currently, the GWRS uses 100 percent of the flows from OCSD Plant 1. Partially funded by a \$450,000 grant from the Bureau of Reclamation's U.S. Water Smart program, the study was completed this past summer and supported the recommendation to implement the Final Expansion. As a result of the study, OCSD implemented diversion projects to segregate flows from its Plant 2 that come from the Santa Ana River Interceptor (SARI) Line, which will not be included in the water sent to the GWRS.

OCSD Chair John Nielsen, Vice Chair Greg Seborn and General Manager Jim Herberg spoke in favor of the Final Expansion during the meeting. They expressed strong support of the project given the numerous benefits it provides to the region ranging from decreasing Orange County's dependence on imported water to decreasing the amount of discharge to the Pacific Ocean.

The OCWD board must approve additional items related to this project in order to fully authorize its implementation. These approvals will likely occur in October and November of this year. Next steps also include the District's pursuit of funding for the project, which includes Proposition 1 grant funding, bonds and State Revolving Fund loans that typically carry a low interest rate.

If fully approved, the project's design phase would be conducted from 2017 through mid-2018 and construction would start in 2019. The total capital cost for the Final Expansion is estimated at \$351 million, which includes the cost of all projects to produce and recharge GWRS water. The projected unit cost of the water will be significantly less than the cost of imported water.

The GWRS takes treated wastewater and purifies it through a three-step process consisting of microfiltration, reverse osmosis and ultraviolet light with hydrogen peroxide. The end result is ultra-pure water that meets or exceeds state and federal drinking water standards.

A portion of GWRS water is injected into a seawater barrier with the remainder being pumped to OCWD's recharge basins where it percolates into the Orange County Groundwater Basin and becomes a primary source of drinking water for 2.4 million people.
